





Background: Webinar on Climate Change organized for school students. We at GNSD work on the implementation of SDGs by active involvement of youth.


Speaker: Dr. Marek Wosinski was invited to speak Earthlings for Climate. An awareness webinar on climate change.



2. Happiness Unlocked Date: April 10 2021





Currently, the world is facing a global health crisis unlike any other — COVID-19 is spreading human suffering, destabilizing the global economy, and upending the lives of billions of people around the globe. COVID-19 pandemic has affected all countries around the world. It hit Asia, Europe and the Americas before gradually taking root in Africa and no area has been spared, whether socially, culturally, or economically.

As the COVID-19 pandemic is sweeping across the world, everyone is hoping for a vaccine that can stop this pandemic on its track. Recently, different organizations have produce vaccines that can help curb the spread of the disease. While some welcome the development of the vaccine, others are skeptical with some going the length of spreading propaganda. The place of hearing different voices, concerns and answering questions in this context has a special meaning. The summer school progressed with expert classes on every weekend till October 24th. Grant Proposal for Sister Schools Project:


Development of Character through Social Engagement and Building Partnerships Across Borders (case of Nepal and Poland)

GNSD team applied for a grant that was submitted to the Templeton Foundation. We did not receive this grant, however, our team did a great job in drafting the project summary and submitting the application. Through the Sister Schools project, GNSD intended to create partnerships between 15 schools in economically developed countries, and 15 schools in Nepal. Such partnerships open new opportunities for both parties. By creating partnerships between schools in Nepal, Poland, and USA. GNSD was planning to develop a model of extracurricular education that can be later applied in other low-income Through this project, **GNSD** provide countries. could participating schools with an opportunity to collaborate and engage in the development of local communities with immediate global consequences.


